### **Funding update**

We are delighted to announce that Medtronic has maintained and increased its support of WIKISTIM by awarding us a grant that met 100% of our request. This award is sufficient to keep us afloat through half of 2015. We are grateful to Medtronic for its continued support and its recognition that WIKISTIM is an increasingly important resource for the field of neuromodulation. We will be submitting additional grant requests to other neuromodulation technology companies in the coming months.

We continue to explore ways to make WIKISTIM self-sufficient. One possibility would be for our parent non-profit, The Neuromodulation Foundation, to become an accredited provider of continuing medical education credits (CME), which we would award to health care providers who successfully complete WIKISTIM data sheets. This activity is more rigorous than many for which CME credit is awarded, and we believe that engaging in it will be of immense value to the recipient of the credit. This would also allow the recipient to contribute to the entire field, since completed WIKISTIM datasheets will be posted (after they have been vetted) for everyone to use. # **INS support**

We are also grateful to the International Neuromodulation Society for its support of our attendance at its upcoming 12th International Congress, "Neuromodulation: Medicine Evolving Through Technology," which will take place June 8-11, 2015 (with pre-conference workshops on the 6th and 7th) in Montreal, Canada. We will have tabletop space dedicated to WIKISTIM in the exhibit area.

# **New Section Editor**

We welcome Roger Dmochowski, MD, a professor in the Department of Urologic Surgery at Vanderbilt, as the Section Editor for Sacral Nerve Stimulation, which will be our next section. We plan to follow this with new sections on Gastric Electrical Stimulation and Vagus Nerve Stimulation; we are seeking nominations for editors of these sections. Section Editors advise us, work with us to develop the data category fields, help us identify citations we might otherwise have missed, and recruit individuals to complete data sheets.

## **Using WIKISTIM**

This month, Dr. North consulted the WIKISTIM search engine while updating a review chapter, and he was pleased that he could 1) sort the list of SCS literature by year published with most recent first and quickly read down the list and 2) easily search for key words and authors' names without the overwhelming number of false positives one finds on PubMed. He noted that the WIKISTIM search engine is not perfect yet; we are once again working to remove a bug that is preventing all of his papers from appearing with a simple search for "north" (we had this problem before and solved it before; we just need to find a permanent solution).

Anyone writing a review article, especially a structured literature review or meta-analysis, could profitably use the appropriate WIKISTIM data sheet and then submit the completed version for uploading. We also gratefully accept partially completed data sheets.

When we have had occasion to use WIKISTIM in the middle of meetings, we called up completed data sheets and found that the design of the online version facilitates readability and presents vital data at a glance.

WIKISTIM can also be used as a teaching tool; assigning the completion of WIKISTIM data sheets to medical students or residents/fellows creates a worthwhile teaching exercise that allows the student to 1) become familiar with the results of a study, 2) improve his or her ability to read carefully and critically, and 3) contribute to the field by submitting the result to WIKISTIM.
